CAPE FEAR RADIO — OF THE PEOPLE, BY THE PEOPLE, FOR THE PEOPLE

C

ape Fear Radio was an idea just waiting to happen.

In July of 2024, a small group of people from Southport and the Town of St. James decided the time was right to

launch a radio station dedicated exclusively to Southeast Brunswick County: Bald Head Island, Boiling Spring Lakes, Caswell Beach, Oak Island, St. James, and Southport.

Cape Fear Radio has grown from that small, core group to a team of more than 50 volunteers today, streaming 24 hours a day, seven days a week. As an internet-based station, Cape Fear Radio can be easily accessed by downloading the app from the Apple or Google App Stores, or directly through its website, *capefearradio.com*. Even though it has a local focus, it can be streamed anywhere in the world. It's a great way for part-time residents of Bald Head Island, as well as permanent residents, to stay in touch with the community.



"I think we're all a little surprised that we've come so far, so fast," said John McIver, one of Cape Fear Radio's cofounders. "The time was right for something like this."

Cape Fear Radio's mission is to help build a stronger sense of community in the region, which is one of the fastest-growing areas in North Carolina. The core of CFR's programming is its extensive library of music spanning a variety of genres and decades, including local musicians. It also offers local news and weather, hand-crafted ads for businesses, features on local personalities and events,

and a physical presence at public events like the U.S. Open King Mackerel Tournament or the summer concert series in Oak Island's Middleton Park, where the station's signature blue tent can be seen.

As a nonprofit 501(c)(3), Cape Fear Radio invests its revenue from advertising into local nonprofits such as Brunswick Family Assistance and Southport Cares. Its Community Investment Initiative makes quarterly grants to organizations working to build supportive, resilient communities.

"Part of our mission is to highlight the many nonprofit groups and civic organizations that are the backbone of our communities," said Debbie Little, who manages the station's public service announcements.

In August, listeners tuned into Cape Fear Radio for a total of more than 10,000 hours, a significant milestone for a community-based radio station. The station recently opened its second studio at Crossroads Gathering Place in Oak Island, joining its original studio in The State Port Pilot building in downtown Southport.

Cape Fear Radio's future is focused on growth by expanding its audience, growing its grants program, and providing a platform for local talent and organizations.

"Because of the quality of our music and features, and our mission to give back to the community, we

don't think there's any other radio station you need other than Cape Fear Radio," McIver said. "We look forward to growing our listenership, building on the great momentum we already have."

NATURE NOTES: BHI WILDLIFE

ald Head Island's forests, marshes, and beaches are alive with an incredible diversity of wildlife. From powerful predators to delicate pollinators, each species plays a role in keeping the Island's ecosystems healthy. In this new series, we

will feature wildlife profiles written by Bald Head Island Conservancy staff and interns, offering readers both science-based insight and fresh perspective from those working closely with the Island's environment.

We begin the series with two species that reflect the range of BHI's wildlife: the American Alligator and the Gulf Fritillary Butterfly. The alligator, an iconic yet often misunderstood resident, helps maintain balance in freshwater habitats. The Gulf Fritillary highlights the beauty of migration, pollination, and native plants. Together, they showcase the island's wildlife from apex predator to essential pollinator.

American Alligator

American alligators are fascinating residents of Bald Head Island and are most often seen basking along the edges of ponds. As top predators, they help keep fish and turtle

populations in balance, while also digging "gator holes" that provide water sources for other wildlife during dry spells. On BHI, alligators tend to be most visible during warmer months, while in colder months they enter a state called brumation, where their metabolism slows down and they become much less active. This allows them to survive during periods of lower temperatures and limited food availability.

Gulf Fritillary

Gulf Fritillary butterflies are a common sighting in the late summer and early fall as they fly south to overwinter in warmer regions. Many stop at BHI on their journey south and lay eggs on their larval host plants, passionflowers (Passiflora). The caterpillars rely on passionflowers to eat and grow rapidly until they form a chrysalis. The metamorphosis takes a few weeks, and a vibrant orange adult Gulf Fritillary emerges. Adult Gulf Fritillary butterflies feed on nectar and pollinate many flowering plants. Protecting native plants, such as Yellow Passionflower, and creating pollinator gardens can provide essential food and habitat for these beautiful butterflies.

The goal is not to reinvent the course, but to restore its spirit, refine its details, and ensure it remains one of the Club's most valuable assets.

Throughout the planning process, the Club has remained committed to transparency and member engagement. As the 2027 project approaches, members can look forward to seeing the vision unfold—protecting the

past, elevating the present, and securing the future of golf on Bald Head Island.



THE DEVELOPMENTAL YEARS OF BHI — PART 2

Ithough Jim Harrington helped develop BHI, Cary, and Southern Shores, he was not born in NC. Indeed, he was born in New Hampshire in 1927. Harrington and his partner at Cambridge Properties, Walter Royal Davis, entered the scene

when they bought the developable land of BHI from BIG in 1979 for \$2.5 million.

Cambridge Properties led the development of BHI from 1979-1983. Jim Harrington, supported by a group of individuals such as John Messick, Harvey Ramsey, Herman Sellers, and countless others I am sure that I am unaware of, transformed a handful of houses connected to a golf course with dirt roads, no running power or water, telephone, or accessible marina, into a viable coastal destination. Harrington was instrumental through it all.

He's since proved to be a well-connected visionary with the knack to identify and rely on experts for guidance to devise a viable plan. Harrington promptly identified the largest concern was access to the Island.

When Cambridge took over, the landing was "'up the creek', at a dock near the 'gazebo'".2 The problem with landing on the creek was that it is quite tidal. At high tide it was fine, however, at low tide one may be required to wade through a couple feet of water to get to land. Indeed, some early Generator Society members recalled favoring plastic liquor bottles over glass because the plastic could float to the shore easier. Harrington allocated \$500k to redesign the marina, plus another \$250k on a dredger.

Harrington commended barge captain Herman Sellers and project manager Harvey Ramsey for being influential to design the barge system. Subsequently, getting people and luggage on/off the ferry was the next challenge. Ramsey designed the gangways, luggage dollies, and the tram system. Those processes remain largely unchanged since conception. Progress into transportation achieved, Harrington turned attention to on-Island infrastructure, such as roads.3

It is likely not widely known that non-utility vehicles remained on Bald Head until 1985. Indeed, Harrington recalled many Generator Society members favored dirt roads and their 4-wheel drive vehicles opposed to golf carts. After "considerable conversations at frequent meetings with home owners" Harrington was able to sway everyone to his side.4 Harvey Ramsey credited his background in the US Army Corps of Engineers as inspiration to use mix-in-place asphalt for the roads; a method that is used frequently to build aircraft runways in remote locations. Harrington limited road width to maintain "tunnels" of trees hanging over the road, and to further his cause to become golf carts only. Finally, some momentum for the Island as the roads were being paved and marina being built, yet, there was still no running water, power, telephone service, or a stable governmental system. Follow along in our final article on the developmental years of BHI to find out just how!

WINTER WEATHER SAFETY TIPS

A

s our area begins to experience colder temperatures, the Village of Bald Head Island encourages islanders to start their winter preparedness efforts. Whether you are a long-time resident or new to the Island, these tips can help keep you

safe during the colder months.

Stay Informed

- Register for the Village's emergency notification system CodeRed. Sign up via your phone by texting BHI to 99411.
- Remain alert for updates from the National Weather Service Wilmington Office (NWS-Wilmington) at weather.gov/ilm. You can find the latest weather briefing at weather.gov/ilm/briefing and winter weather information at weather.gov/ilm/winter.
- Have multiple ways to get weather information (local news and radio stations, NOAA weather radios, National Weather Service, emergency alert notifications, etc.)
- Sign up for Duke Energy Progress alerts at www.dukeenergy.com/outages/alerts and report outages by calling (800) 419-6356.

Fire Prevention & Heat Safety Tips

Most deaths that occur during winter storms are not a direct result of the weather. Instead, people die from home fires and carbon monoxide poisoning while using alternative ways to heat or power their homes. Take time to safeguard your home against these dangers and ensure the well-being of your family, pets, and property.

- Check your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Always plug space heaters directly into wall outlets, and make sure the cords and plugs aren't damaged or frayed. DON'T use an extension cord or power strip.
- Place space heaters on a solid, flat surface and keep them at least three feet from other items. Turn them off when leaving the room or sleeping.
- NEVER use a stove, oven, or charcoal grill to heat your home
- Operate generators outdoors, away from doors and windows to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Keep all heat sources—including fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, portable heaters, or candles—at least three feet away from anything that can burn.



- Inspect holiday lights each year before you use them.
 Throw away light strands with frayed or pinched wires.
 Turn off all holiday lights before going to bed or leaving your home.
- Water natural Christmas trees daily or keep their tree stands filled with water. Get rid of the tree if it dries out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected each year by a professional.

Protect Water Systems from Freezing Temperatures

Your pipes are at risk of freezing any time temperatures drop below 32°F or 0°C. Prevent costly pipe damage this winter by taking precautions to protect household and irrigation water systems from freezing.

- Insulate pipes in unheated areas of your home and crawl spaces.
- Seal any gaps and cracks in your home's exterior (such as crawl spaces) to prevent cold drafts from reaching your pipes.
- Disconnect water hoses from outdoor spigots and turn off irrigation systems.
- Open doors to cabinets below your sinks to help warmer air circulate around plumbing at night.
- Allow a small amount of water to drip from your faucets. Running water, even at a trickle, helps prevent pipes from freezing.
- Always be aware of the main water shut-off valve location for your home in case you should experience a burst pipe and need to turn off your water. Contact Village Utilities if you need assistance (910) 457-9700 ext, 1000.

CELEBRATING CREATIVITY: THE SMITH ISLAND ART **I FAGUE**

Smith Island Art League president Prudy Weaver took a circuitous route to painting Bald Head Island. After careers in retail, interior design, real estate, and contracting, she paused to care for her mother. Searching for an activity they could share, the two enrolled in a watercolor class, and Prudy discovered a passion that would carry her forward. She now paints in oils and has been part of the Bald Head Island community since her family built a vacation home here in 1997.

Founded in 1993 by six artists, including current member Nancy Giacci, the Smith Island Art League has grown to 22 property owners who work in a wide variety of mediums. From jewelry and textiles to pottery, wood, photography, and painting, the artists draw inspiration from Bald Head Island's natural beauty and sense of place.



The object we are showcasing is a Generator Society charter or official certificate of membership. This charter was donated to the Old Baldy Foundation by Ginny Wester Reeves in 2024. The document distinguished Generator Society Members for enduring "inconvenience and privation in exchange for the privilege of being married to Bald Head." Ginny is the descendant of the first president of the Generator Society Membership, Dr. Thad Wester. The framed charters were presented to 16 families at a cookout held in the Spring of 1980. The cookout was originally scheduled to be held at the Point, yet, inclement weather pushed the gathering to the original Inn. Dr. Thad Wester showcased "another chapter in his unending roles of versatility" by cooking jambalaya for the 100 person gathering. The gathering also included an awards ceremony hosted by member Bill Byrne. The Harper family brought home the "First Disaster Award", whereas the German Shepard of the Thomas' claimed the coveted "Raccoon Preservation Award" for "efforts to control the exploding raccoon population." sincerely thanks Ginny Wester Reeves for donating this cherished artifact. It provides a tangible glimpse into the hardships the Society went through, such as the Easter Weekend Fire of 1975. As well as the humorous ways they memorialized those events, as shown by the cheeky "First Disaster Award", given to the Harpers whose house was the scene of the fire. In addition, the charter displays some pretty solid calligraphy likely penned by one of the Westers.

I hope you find time to enjoy the season with family, friends, and neighbors. On behalf of the Board, I thank you for your continued support and commitment to our community.



For upcoming holidays such as Thanksgiving and Christmas, some property owners may be wondering about exterior decorations on Bald Head Island and what is compliant with the Design Guidelines.

Here are some important points to be aware of for any outdoor decorations you are considering. Visit *www. BaldHeadAssociation.com* for the Design Guidelines. "Decorative Items" are on page 38.

All exterior decorative items such as planters, statuary, water features, feeders, wind chimes, birdbaths and other ornamental items and structures must be harmonious with the community aesthetic, site, home and surrounding environment.

All exterior decorative items (including temporary holiday decorations) must be constructed of natural and organic materials and blend seamlessly within the

home and landscape design. Colors should complement the natural surroundings. Holiday novelty decorations like blowups and items that are inconsistent with this guideline are not allowed. See additional information under Lighting. These exterior decorative items must be few in number and consistent with the general subdued and natural character of the Bald Head Island conservation consciousness.

Regarding exterior holiday lighting specifically, here is the guideline (on page 43 of the Design Guidelines):

Holiday lighting is permitted from Nov. 15 to Jan. 15 only. Moderation is recommended. No holiday or string lighting is to be used for exterior decoration any other time during

the year, including clear or white lights, nor is it permitted to be used to illuminate any exterior steps, porches, arbors, structures, etc. any other time of year.




