Want to Join the BHA Board of Directors?

HA's Board of Directors believes it functions most effectively if it has diversity among its members. This includes, but is not limited to, sex, gender, sexual or gender preference, national origin, religion, race, age, educational background, employment experience, prior HOA experience, prior BHA committee experience and any and all of the other differentiating characteristics that makes each of its members special and unique. The overall expectations of a BHA Board member are to:

- Serve a three-year term
- Serve as a Board liaison to one of BHA's committees
- Attend meetings in person and/or remotely

There are two ways to be considered for BHA Board service. First, the Nominating Committee is charged with selecting at least one candidate for each vacancy and recommending them directly to BHA's membership for consideration at the Annual Meeting. This year's deadline for 2024 Board candidate submittals was July 31. Nominating Committee Chair Joe Brawner informed the Board of the committee's selection of candidates at its regular September Board meeting and includes Michael Bumarch, Chris Parrish, Elizabeth (Betty) Robinson and Steven H. Smalley.

Additional information will be shared with the membership in the 2023 Annual Report, mailed in early December. New this year, Board candidates will be invited to participate in a forum hosted by BHA in

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BHI Native Plant Feature of the Month Wax Myrtle

Wax Myrtle (*Myrica cerifera*) is commonly known as Bayberry, Candleberry, Dwarf Bayberry, Dwarf Wax-myrtle, Eastern Bayberry, Southern Bayberry, Southern Waxmyrtle, Southern Wax Myrtle, Tallow Shrub, Waxmyrtle and Wax Myrtle. It's a hardy, southern, heat-loving evergreen species that is native to North Carolina marshes, forests, swamps and streams. It is useful in wetlands or restoration gardens, in wet or shady areas or on a bank for erosion control.

It has light, olive-green colored leaves and gold/yellow or green flowers in the spring. It also produces clusters of waxy, aromatic, bluish-white berries in late summer and early fall. Its berries have been used for many years to make bayberry-scented products like soaps and

ARC Update

Where did this year go? And what a busy year it's been at the ARC! For each new construction, which currently totals approximately 25, there are typically three separate reviews (Draft, Preliminary and Final). A combined total of 62 of those separate reviews has gone through the

ARC process in the first three quarters of 2023. There were also Major and Minor Renovation, Plant Material Change and Paint/Color applications, for a whopping total of 255 reviews by the Architectural Review Committee, all submitted by your friends and neighbors. Over 83% of these submittals were approved. Sometimes applications are withdrawn by the property owner or not approved because they weren't in compliance with the Design Guidelines.

By purchasing a home or lot, members agree and are obligated to abide by the Covenants because they run with the land.

What does this activity mean for you and your investment on Bald Head Island? It means that there are more new homes proposed and your ARC volunteers and staff are working hard to ensure the Design Guidelines' standards are maintained. It's a division of labor, with the staff doing the technical reviews to make sure the applications are complete and meet the minimum requirements and the volunteers, who make decisions that affect the vision of BHI as a place where the community works together to cultivate the unique quality of life here.

There are 18 ARC volunteers, divided into two teams, with each section meeting 11 times a year. Section A reviews projects west of Muscadine Wynd, and Section B reviews projects to the east of Muscadine Wynd and within the multifamily

clear for traffic, promotes proper storm drainage and eliminates areas where pests can make a home where they are not wanted.

The Village offers debris pickup for property owners who do their own yard work. Most of the debris is turned into

Why Are More Roosting Birds Flocking to the Wildlife Overlook?

The BHI Conservancy conducted an environmental research project this past summer at both Ibis Pond and the Wildlife Overlook to observe how water quality is affecting wildlife biodiversity. The Ibis Sanctuary used to be an ideal, scenic birding site as hundreds of ibis, egrets and herons came to roost nightly. But it has had a noticeable decline in the number of roosting birds and wildlife sightings in recent years. Meanwhile, hundreds of birds have been flocking in waves to the Wildlife Overlook. Brunswick County Students Become Barrier Island Botanists With BHI Conservancy Program



Have you noticed groups of students exploring Bald Head these past few weeks? They aren't skipping school or running away from home; these young people are attending our Barrier Island Botanist (BIB) program, a collaboration between Brunswick County Schools and the Bald Head Island Conservancy. Started in 2018, the BIB field trip program has hosted more than 1,000 sixth grade students annually from Brunswick County. Originally funded through a corporate grant prior to the pandemic, BIB was brought back in 2022 thanks to the generosity of Jim, Devon, and Sinclair Brown.

"The Barrier Island Botanist program is an amazing opportunity for local kids to experience our island's ecosystem in such a fun and memorable way," says Devon Brown. "We truly believe that being able to visit the island and participate in hands-on activities with the BHIC's phenomenal educational and scientific staff will resonate with them in a way that really complements and builds upon

classroom curriculum. Our hope is that generations to come take the lessons they've

learned and incorporate the BHIC message into their lives, particularly as climate change becomes a critical concern, both here on the coast and worldwide."

On a typical day of BIB, BHIC staff bring about 60 students and their teachers to Bald Head Island. Because our island consists of three primary ecosystems — the maritime forest, the salt marsh and the coastal dunes — students have the unique opportunity to experience this rare natural laboratory without traveling beyond the county border. Our program takes students to three different stations around the marina, where they learn about dune structure, saltmarsh food webs and the relationships between maritime forest flora and fauna.

BHIC Education Director Jennifer Wiggen works alongside Brunswick County Curriculum Coordinators to create fun activities that reinforce concepts the students are learning in class, providing hands-on experiences that demonstrate the complexity of coastal species and the connectivity between coastal processes and habitats. Students are challenged to work collaboratively and use their critical thinking skills to investigate how different plant species have adapted to live

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BHA Annual Report Packets, Annual Meeting and Voting

On the last Saturday of each January, Bald Head Association members gather to elect a new board of directors, consider any board-recommended changes to governing documents and learn about the Association's challenges and successes from the previous year.

Hurricanes of the Past — Part 3

Historians do not usually write about recent events. In fact, I had a little bit of difficulty formulating an approach to discuss rainfall. The rainfall, at least 30 inches over two days, resulted in the highest single storm rainfall amount in Wilmington

this 2018 hurricane that so greatly impacted

our area. It is one thing to discuss the American Civil War or even 1990s hurricanes, but quite another to discuss the devastation wreaked by Hurricane Florence. Yet, here we are. So, let us look back five years to mid-September of 2018.

Hurricane Florence approached Wrightsville Beach as a category 1 hurricane, with maximum sustained winds of 90 mph. The predicament looked bleak, due to a wet summer that year plus lingering damage from Hurricane Matthew in 2016. Mandatory evacuations began on Bald Head Island

on September 12, 2018. Two days later, Florence churned into Wrightsville Beach, just above BHI. For the next two days, Florence barely moved while pounding the area with intense

history. Although the high winds helped contribute to 90% of

New Hanover County losing power for approximately 110,000 people, the aftermath flooding remains infamous.

It usually takes a day or two after a storm for flooding to begin in earnest. The aftermath began in Boiling Spring Lakes, when lakes breached multiple dams overnight on September 15, 2018. Three days later, the Village of BHI reported, "All of the major wynds including WBHW, NBHW, Federal (both lanes), Stede Bonnet and many of the secondary roads all within and under the canopy of the maritime forest are presently impassable."

Meanwhile, Wilmington temporarily

became an island itself when all roads in and out of the city flooded. On September 20, 2018, the North Carolina Department of Public Safety stated, "There is not a safe, stable

or reliable route for the public to take to and from Wilmington." At the height of the storm, there were over 20,000 people living in storm shelters. People and even shorebirds were displaced. Coastal birds such as terns, oystercatchers and petrels were spotted 40 miles east of Raleigh at the Buckhorn Reservoir. Eventually, people were able to get back to their homes and assess the destruction.

Florence resulted in \$16.7 billion in damages in North Carolina, with 74,563 structures reporting flood damage. Repairs are still underway for the 1919 Alton Lennon Federal Building and Courthouse in Wilmington, due to Florence. Old Baldy sustained multiple instances of damage to the stucco

that covers and protects the brick structure. Thankfully, the Old Baldy Foundation received a federal grant to repair damages. We are also using that relief funding for an archeological dig to look for evidence of a glacis wall around the base of Old Baldy. If found, we will recreate the wall to better stabilize Old Baldy against future storms.

Many buildings, such as the circa 1915 Bald Head Creek Boathouse, did not make it. The boathouse was a valuable piece of history that told the story of the US Lighthouse Service and United States Life Saving Service. It had been the second Bald Head Island site on the National Register of Historic Places. In addition, thousands of our trees were knocked down or weakened.

Non-emergency personnel first assessed the destruction when they were allowed to return to BHI on September 27-28, 2018. Old Baldy did not welcome visitors again

BHI Academy and Its Acorns

Sowing the Seeds of Successful Knowledge Transfer into the Next Generation

Human beings are complicated. It makes sense our children would be, too. So, why would we think that teaching our kids would be uncomplicated? The educational complexity becomes even more challenging with each child's state of mind: dyslexia, ADHD, autism, high IQ, high functioning, shy, disruptive behavior, etc. And then what about those children with issues such as hearing loss and/or sensory deficits. At Bald Head Island Academy (BHIATM) we have an educational approach, with the right formula of a high teacher to student ratio, plus exceptional empathy embedded throughout where we have the compassion to find — and actually *see* — and teach each individual child.

With its small class size and teachers who are equipped with a variety of teaching modalities, BHIA guides children to discover (and celebrate) how they learn best, helping them become independent thinkers and lifelong learners. ADHD, we have created a carefully structured environment within our blended, small classroom to support their learning adventure, complete with leadership components and a strong athletic program. We find that kids (particularly those with ADHD) thrive academically when they have a rigorous athletic regimen; revving up their physical engine calms their mindset so they can tackle the work and handle the tasks.

Because of our in-the-moment, applied learning methodology, what our scholars are learning matters. Rather than memorization or other old-school, antiquated modalities, our little Acorns are engaged because they have a vested interest in what they are learning, and it applies to them *now*. For example, one of our students who is passionate about robotics is leading younger scholars in an exploration of technology. Another student is mentoring younger peers in nature photography, inspiring an appreciation and love for not only art but also the natural world (and there is no better natural habitat than the one on BHI). All of this is happening every day with these sometimes goofy, always amazing children. That's how we teach, in a nutshell, but there is more to our secret sauce as to why it's working.

BHIA's whole-child methodology allows our educators to teach lessons unique to each child's strengths and needs, giving *Continued on page 13*

the scholars more confidence, immediate academic improvement from previous pain points and incredible adaptability for dealing with life's lessons. This bespoke, fit-forpurpose, tailored approach is different from public schools and larger schools — often with one teacher for every 12 to 30 students (and all the disciplinary issues that come with large class sizes that detract from the learning experience). There, you can liken teaching to a lawn mower — some blades of grass (children) will be trimmed just right, others too much and yet others not at all.

Continuing the analogy, and in contrast, at BHIA we have bonsai scissors to transform the raw Acorns into works of art!

The key to our secret sauce is "The Isle of Ideas" that lives within our talented volunteers and a commitment to teaching. BHI is the nexus for the best and brightest. BHIA utilizes engaging and fun activities to pique each Acorn's interest, but still teaches solid fundamentals so that the children see how "boring" learning is applied in everyday life. In addition to our experienced, full-time teachers, Sarah Tennant and Andrew Hano, our incredible school is supported by a volunteer K-12 math teacher, Barbara McCarthy, who shares her passion for all things math and science. Over the summer, scholars experienced a living history lesson at the McCarthy's home, the Old Coast Guard Station. They discovered



that math is everywhere, even on a yacht. And they talked turtles with our world-class BHI Conservancy experts. They enjoyed a painting lesson with corporate executive-turned-artist, Meredith Bourne and are exploring their love for photography with Dr. Ted Peck. Former chemist and aviator, Doug Oakley, will expose older students to an ecosystem preservationfocused flight experience. Our scholars are learning entomology and commerce through beekeeping, with plans to commercialize their product in 2024. Politician Bill Bennett presented the school with his *Book of Virtues*,

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Bald Head Island's Pollinator Garden: It Takes a Village

It all started with a simple question from Megan Stephenson to her employer, Harper Peterson. "Wouldn't it be great to have a pollinator garden here in the Marina Park?" Megan has an MS degree in Conservation Medicine from Tufts University and is a critical part of Harper's team, spending much of her time helping outfit Islanders and guests for excursions in the creek, so she has a lot of time to inspect the natural flora and fauna in Marina Park. But Megan had a vision for something more grand.

I happened to run into Harper Peterson just after Megan had posed her question, and he asked me how we could make a pollinator garden happen. Fortuitously BHA's Education and Recreation (ER) Committee had just brought back the Garden Club, so I knew just the person — Grace Valentine, chair of that club — to lead



the charge. To paraphrase a TV show, "And just like that," the Pollinator Garden on BHI was born. After two meetings with all potential stakeholders (the Village, BHA, BHI Conservancy and Garden Club), we were off and running. Megan had proposed seven zones for the Pollinator Garden, several of which already contained native plants. Zone 1 was designated as behind the

of Directors, may be submitted to the Association office no later than sixty (60) days prior to the annual meeting and this candidate or candidates shall be added to the final ballot which will be mailed to the membership no less than thirty (30) days in advance of the annual meeting."

This year, November 27 is the 60-day deadline for petitions to be received by BHA. Of course, that date is the final deadline, and submissions can be sent any time prior to the deadline. Note that all Board candidates are required to complete a biography/questionnaire and send a photo for publication in BHA's Annual Report and on BHA's website to help inform members of candidates' credentials. With a tight print deadline, all biography/questionnaires and photos must be received by 4:00pm November 28, 2023. All who are interested in submitting a petition can email BHA Executive Director Carrie Moffett at *Carrie@BaldHeadAssociation.com*.

The Nominating Committee is appointed by the Board of Directors and consists of a chairperson, who is a member of the Board of Directors, and four members of the Association who are not currently members of the Board of Directors. and candles. Historically, the plant was also used to make medicine by Native Americans.

Wax Myrtles can be used as a barrier or hedge and are a beneficial wildlife food source. According to the NC Cooperative Extension, "It attracts butterflies, pollinators, small mammals and songbirds. It is a host plant for the Red-Banded Hairstreak butterfly. Its flowers provide an excellent source of nectar for honeybees and butterflies. The fruits are eaten by birds, especially the yellow-rumped warbler in the fall and winter."

Wax Myrtles are exceptional for a butterfly, pollinator or herb garden because they are "highly resistant to salt, sea spray and deer damage. They can grow 20 to 25 feet tall but are usually much shorter. They are easily grown in medium to wet sandy soils in full sun to dappled or partial shade." Because of its aesthetic appeal, colorful flowers and fragrant berries, it is a wonderful plant for a coastal garden.

developments. With an average of 15-18 reviews per meeting, these dedicated volunteers commit to monthly meetings that can last 2-4 hours, plus the time spent reviewing projects prior to the meeting. Some volunteers take paint samples out to the sites to see how the colors actually look in both sunlight and shade, and make sure the streetscape is harmonious. Others may make site visits to assess the impact of a major renovation or new construction on the neighboring houses. And each year, they review the Design Guidelines and recommend any changes to the BHA Board. We thank them for their devotion to Bald Head Island and for their commitment to preserving its ageless appeal for generations to come.

bulwark to the left as one looks out to the creek, and we quickly determined that the perfect day for planting Zone 1 would be Earth Day, April 22, 2023.

After deciding on the depth of the planting area, BHA Board member and veteran gardener, John Kinney, and Megan consulted on the best plants - most of which are native to BHI - and developed a mock-up of plant locations. John not only bought all of the plants, primarily from Shelton Herb Garden in Leland, but he also transported them all to the Island and tended the plants until April 22, when we could plant them.

Meanwhile, Harper Peterson tilled the ground, and the newly formed Garden Club members prepared the bed, with Grace Valentine, Deb Feeney and Barbara Giera heading up the effort.

Each stakeholder was in their own lane, and since I'm not much of a gardener, I took up the task of fundraising. Two major efforts in the spring - BHI Trivia Night at Jailhouse Provisions and a

honey-inspired talk by Desiree Bridge (from the BHI Conservancy) — brought us enough money to purchase the spring plants. We can't thank the kind participants and donors enough for believing in us when all we had was some dirt and lots of ambition.

In addition, Ginny Wester Reeves needed to move the bricks that had lined her father's (Thad Wester) walkway through his garden at their home on Bay Tree Trail. J.P. McCann, the Village's Public Services Director, agreed to take the bricks, as long as they were put onto pallets. Ginny, Cam McIntyre, Elizabeth Kinney and I ended up filling four pallets of bricks — yes, they were laid one by one, all by hand. J.P.'s crew wrapped each pallet in shrink wrap and then delivered one of the four pallets to Marina Park. Dale and Barbara Giera, owners of Trinity Builders BHI, generously offered the services of their bricklayers to prepare and create the brick path.

on the island, how those plants protect our island from storms and erosion and how they support our wildlife. These activities also mirror current Conservancy research projects, emphasizing how the work we do supports and protects our environment and our homes.

The students learning on our beaches, in our marshes and around the maritime forest this fall will be bringing more home with them than just sand in their shoes; they're also gaining a new understanding of the importance of the Bald Head environment to our island community, southeastern North Carolina and the ocean biome as a whole. Together, we can all have a positive impact conserving and preserving this great gift of an island that we and so many amazing species call home.

until October 6, 2018, while our Island-wide tours were suspended until November 2018. Florence was bad, but it could have been worse. It is up to us to stay diligent in preparation of storms and to unite afterwards to mitigate what damages occurred. The only predictable aspect of a hurricane is that they are unpredictable. We do not know when the next one will come. All we can do is prepare for the worst, hope for the best and enjoy every beautiful day on the Island between the storms.




